The silence, unrelenting heat, and the bare rock and sand make the desert a wild and unforgiving place, a place where guides are necessary . Without them, one would most certainly go astray.

In the Prophet Hosea, we hear how God's beloved – the people of Israel – drift away. No longer fully attentive to the love that God is offering them, they find themselves in their own kind of desert or wild place..... Yet, all is not lost because God – like a guide - is there before them and, in the silence, speaks tenderly heart to heart.....

"I will allure her..... I will lead her into the desert and speak to her heart."

God who is integrity and justice helps Israel to live again with integrity and iustice.



Today we remember St. Bakhita who experienced her own 'desert wilderness'.

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Born in 1869 near Darfur in Sudan, she enjoyed a happy childhood.



Speaking later of her experience she recalled..... I was surrounded by a loving family and lived a very happy and carefree life without knowing what suffering was.

One day desert slavetraders came to our village and I was captured. Separated from my family, I was bought and sold many times over. Then, I knew suffering. After many years and some very difficult experiences, Bakhita found herself in domestic service, first to an Arab, then to a Turk, and finally to the Michieli family who brought her to Italy, and to their home in Mirano, near Venice, where she became nanny to their daughter Alice.







In the gospel, all who were in need of healing were brought to Jesus.

They found they were not alone in their suffering and his presence made them whole.

This same healing was Bakhita's too. By walking young Alice to school each day she met the Cannossian Sisters and her contact with them filled her life with new hope.

She discovered God, "who from childhood" she had felt in her heart "without knowing who he was."

Gradually she was drawn to commit her life to the Canossian Sisters.

Her life as a Sister became one of 'service freely given' and all who came into *her* presence were touched by Jesus alive in her. She is venerated as an African saint and is patron of victims and survivors of the modern slavery which is Human Trafficking.
